

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Prime Minister delivers a brutal message for public sector workers

increases to the pay offers made by the outgoing Tory Government under Sunak. Train drivers, teachers and junior doctors, all accepted better offers. But it seems that when it comes to Local Government and School Support Staff, there is nothing left for us once again. The only option for us now to bring the government back to the table, is to REJECT the current offer.

Starmer under heavy criticism from Union's and delegates at TUC conference



Pay Award Should Not Mean Job Losses For School Support Staff

The situation in several schools across Cambridgeshire has in the past, seen redundancies in School Support Staff to fund the NJC pay award. This time, that should not happen as the offer has already been added, as part of the additional funding schools will receive for Teacher's pay award.

Unlike Teacher's, Support Staff are employed on NJC terms, the pay awarded to Support Staff is negotiated via this body, made up of Unison, GMB, Unite and the employer. This is set to change as the Government is set to re-instate the School Support Staff Negotiating Body (SSSNB) in the coming months. This will give School Support Staff a greater voice at the table. It will also mean a review of the national terms and conditions handbook, as well as looking at career pathways and training, as well as the all important pay rates for Support Staff. The SSSNB, will then be responsible for recommending your annual pay award and the government will decide on the final outcome.
